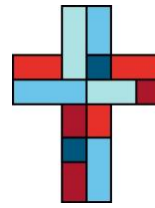

Ash Wednesday 1st March

Many chances to start Lent the right way.

Traditional morning prayer in the Lady Chapel at St Andrew's at 7.30am (you should still be able to commute to work).

Communion with ashing at 12 noon at St Mark's (said)

Choral Eucharist with ashing at 7.30pm at St Mark's.

Women's World Day of Prayer on Friday 3rd March at St Mark's church at 10.30am. The service is based around Praying for The Philippines. All are welcome. We are the local centre for this day of prayer which is not just nationwide but worldwide. It will be a fantastic service. There is on the same day a service at St Joseph's, New Malden 8pm.

Next Sunday March 5th: day of music.

The 9.15am eucharist will be at St Mark's. This is not only the first Sunday of Lent, it is also the second Sunday at which our children's choir will be singing alongside the adult choir. Please do come to support.

The sound should be amazing as the joint choir will be 35 strong.

Collect

Almighty Father,
whose Son was revealed in majesty
before he suffered death upon the cross:
give us grace to perceive his glory,

Today's themes:

The mountain top and the valley: in the Bible, moments of encounter with God often happened on mountains: even today, mountainous landscapes can be inspiring. And yet you always have to come down from the mountain in the end: we cannot always live at high octane levels of religious inspiration. Jesus' divinity was revealed to humans on a mountain in a way that superseded the law, which was revealed on a mountain long before. Following him will take us down the mountain too.

First Reading **Exodus 24.12-21**
Reader Jane Kosa

The Lord said to Moses, 'Come up to me on the mountain, and wait there; and I will give you the tablets of stone, with the law and the commandment, which I have written for their instruction.' So Moses set out with his assistant Joshua, and Moses went up into the mountain of God. To the elders he had said, 'Wait here for us, until we come to you again; for Aaron and Hur are with you; whoever has a dispute may go to them.' Then Moses went up on the mountain, and the cloud covered the mountain. The glory of the Lord settled on Mount Sinai, and the cloud covered it for six days; on the seventh day he called to Moses out of the cloud. Now the appearance of the glory of the Lord was like a devouring fire on the top of the mountain in the sight of the people of Israel. Moses entered the cloud, and went up on the mountain. Moses was on the mountain for forty days and forty nights.

Second Reading Reader

2 Peter 1.16 -end

For we did not follow cleverly devised myths when we made known to you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we had been eyewitnesses of his majesty. For he received honour and glory from God the Father when that voice was conveyed to him by the Majestic Glory, saying, 'This is my Son, my Beloved, with whom I am well pleased.' We ourselves heard this voice come from heaven, while we were with him on the holy mountain. So we have the prophetic message more fully confirmed. You will do well to be attentive to this as to a lamp shining in a dark place, until the day dawns and the morning star rises in your hearts. First of all you must understand this, that no prophecy of scripture is a matter of one's own interpretation, because no prophecy ever came by human will, but men and women moved by the Holy Spirit spoke from God.

Gospel

Matthew 17.1-9

Six days later, Jesus took with him Peter and James and his brother John and led them up a high mountain, by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, and his face shone like the sun, and his clothes became dazzling white. Suddenly there appeared to them Moses and Elijah, talking with him. Then Peter said to Jesus, 'Lord, it is good for us to be here; if you wish, I will make three dwellings here, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah.' While he was still speaking, suddenly a bright cloud overshadowed them, and from the cloud a voice said, 'This is my Son, the Beloved; with him I am well pleased; listen to him!' When the disciples heard this, they fell to the ground and were overcome by fear. But Jesus came and touched them, saying, 'Get up and do not be afraid.' And when they looked up, they saw no one except Jesus himself alone. As they were coming down the mountain, Jesus ordered them, 'Tell no one about the vision until after the Son of Man has been raised from the dead.'
