

Collect

Almighty Father,
whose will is to restore all things
in your beloved Son, the King of all:

Today's themes

In all three readings, there is the theme of repentance. It is easy to forget that the baptism that was called to Jesus was one of repentance from sins. And it is also what Jesus preached too. That's what the call is in Jonah and it is what is described in Hebrews. It is an appropriate set of readings for Remembrance Sunday.

First Reading **Jonah 3.1- 5,10**
Reader Peter Stokes

The word of the Lord came to Jonah a second time, saying, 'Get up, go to Nineveh, that great city, and proclaim to it the message that I tell you. 'So Jonah set out and went to Nineveh, according to the word of the Lord. Now Nineveh was an exceedingly large city, a three days' walk across. Jonah began to go into the city, going a day's walk. And he cried out, 'Forty days more, and Nineveh shall be overthrown!' And the people of Nineveh believed God; they proclaimed a fast, and everyone, great and small, put on sackcloth. When God saw what they did, how they turned from their evil ways, God changed his mind about the calamity that he had said he would bring upon them; and he did not do it.

Psalm 23

1 The Lord ¹ is my ¹ shepherd;
therefore ¹ can I ¹ lack ¹ nothing.
2 He makes me lie down in ¹ green ¹ pastures
and ¹ leads me be¹side still ¹ waters.
3 He shall re¹fresh my ¹ soul
and guide me in the paths of righteousness ¹ for his ¹ name's ¹ sake.
4 Though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death,
I will ¹ fear no ¹ evil;
for you are with me;
your ¹ rod and your ¹ staff, they ¹ comfort me.
5 You spread a table before me
in the presence of ¹ those who ¹ trouble me;
you have anointed my head with oil ¹ and my ¹ cup shall be ¹ full.
6 Surely goodness and loving mercy shall follow me
all the ¹ days of my ¹ life,
and I will dwell in the ¹ house of the ¹ Lord for ¹ ever.

Second Reading **Hebrews 9.24-end**

For Christ did not enter a sanctuary made by human hands, a mere copy of the true one, but he entered into heaven itself, now to appear in the presence of God on our behalf. Nor was it to offer himself again and again, as the high priest enters the Holy

Place year after year with blood that is not his own; for then he would have had to suffer again and again since the foundation of the world. But as it is, he has appeared once for all at the end of the age to remove sin by the sacrifice of himself. And just as it is appointed for mortals to die once, and after that the judgement, so Christ, having been offered once to bear the sins of many, will appear a second time, not to deal with sin, but to save those who are eagerly waiting for him.

Gospel **Mark 1.14-20**

Now after John was arrested, Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God, and saying, 'The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news.' As Jesus passed along the Sea of Galilee, he saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting a net into the lake—for they were fishermen. And Jesus said to them, 'Follow me and I will make you fish for people.' And immediately they left their nets and followed him. As he went a little farther, he saw James son of Zebedee and his brother John, who were in their boat mending the nets. Immediately he called them; and they left their father Zebedee in the boat with the hired men, and followed him.
