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A VIEW FROM THE VICAR

It is possible that you are unaware of Jean Vanier, but his story is an incredible one. An ordinary if academically excellent Francophone Canadian, as a young man, he had a startling spiritual insight. This is that, while the society around him took a dim view of those with intellectual learning disabilities, and saw them as, at best, creatures to be helped, in fact, these people were as beautiful and as important a part of God's creation as those with full intellectual capacity. They were not people to be helped, so much as people whose company should be enjoyed and they should be treated as equals.

Instead of helping them as an 'other', he chose to live with them, and he started L'Arche (ark) communities. Today there are hundreds of these all across the world. In them, people who are learning-disabled and those of full intellectual capacity live together, pray together, eat together and have fun together. They are a near miraculous embodiment of the Christian Gospel, and they came from Vanier's personal vision.

He died last year and the obituaries were a mass of tributes to his great kindness and spirituality. It is possible that you have foreseen the 'but' coming in all of this. The 'but' is that last week, a report was published which revealed that Vanier engaged in sexually inappropriate relationships with a string of women over a four decade period. A pattern emerged whereby a woman came to him for spiritual guidance and Vanier offered it, with prayers, and then he encouraged the woman to follow through this prayer with bodily contact with him and then sexual touching, until a sexual relationship was fully formed, but one to which the woman had never actually consented. It started when he was in his forties and he was still doing this in his seventies.

The testimonies are rather creepy: one woman said she tried to stop him, saying contact with Vanier was not the same as praying to Jesus; he is said to have replied, "Jesus and myself, this is not two but we are one. It is Jesus who loves you through me."

And so we are faced with the fact that the same visionary who pioneered an authentic Christian Gospel through his own personal spiritual insight and who lived it out was also a serial sexual predator. Six women independently came forward, all with similar experiences; none had spoken to each other about their experiences beforehand.

On one level, this is gut wrenchingly awful. Personally, I am still coming to terms with it, but at some kind of personal distance. For others it is worse: for example, one Catholic writer, the journalist JD Flynn, has two Down's syndrome children, one of whom is named Vanier; Jean Vanier has been his great spiritual inspiration. But what to do now?

I do not have the answers to that, but there are two positive aspects that have come to mind. First, is that, at last, these women are being heard, believed and supported. I pray that they find some relief in that, though the damage is basically already done. Second, even as a saintly figure is besmirched, the L'Arche communities themselves go on, and they continue to thrive with people living together, who are enjoying each other's company and who are not following the false gods of mammon or status. Despite Vanier's flaws, something beautiful was created in part through him. The spirit of God can work with tainted material and still produce gold. And that is something for which to be grateful.



In recent years we have been lucky enough to sing Choral Evensong in some wonderful Cathedrals around the south of England including Portsmouth, Chichester, Guildford, Southwark and, most recently, Winchester last year. We have joined together with the choir of St Matthew's for these occasions and the joint choirs have performed to a very high standard on each occasion.

2020 will be no less exciting and our adult choir will be singing Choral Evensong at Canterbury Cathedral on Monday April 13th (Easter Monday) at 5.30pm for which we will be, once again, joining together with the choir from St Matthew's. 



SURBITON'S TREASURES

Did you know the English novelist and poet Thomas Hardy lived in Surbiton with his wife Emma in the mid 1870s.

Aged 33, both starting married life together at St David's Villa on Hook Road.


St David's Villa was a row of houses built in 1872 on the Hook Road, also known as Southborough Road. Near to the Maypole Inn.

St David's Villa is no longer there sadly and was knocked down in 1960. Most of the houses were replaced with modern builds and flats.

I wonder if he ever spent an evening drinking a quiet pint of ale at the Maypole Inn writing his next creative masterpiece!




The site of Hardy's house, is where the corner of Midhurst Court (left of the photo) now stands.

Thomas Hardy 1840-1928




A BEAUTIFUL PUZZLE

The magnificent main stained glass panel in the Chancel (Altar) area at St Andrew's Church, Surbiton has looked down over countless congregations since the church was built in 1871/2. Much has been written about the building and its origins, but little is recorded about the stained glass, particularly the wonderful central stained glass panel. Unfortunately, we have been unable to identify the actual designer of the piece. We know that Lavers, Barraud and Westlake designed and installed the early stained glass in the Baptistry and Chancel although it's unclear whether the company were involved in the later stained glass installations.

In the mid 19th century, Lavers, Barraud and Westlake were among many young designers who responded to the growing market for stained glass windows. The partnership initially comprised Nathanial Lavers and Francis Barraud, but a freelance artist, Nathanial Westlake, joined them as a partner in 1868, having worked with the architect Willsim Burgess and with Alfred Bell of Clayton and Bell. The company also employed other freelance designers. The company went of business in 1921.


Nathanial Westlake designed some of the wonderful stained glass panels in All Saints Church Kingston Upon Thames, but we are unable to say whether he was involved in the St Andrew's stained glass; it seems unlikely as the style and colour range of his work at All Saint's is very different to that of St Andrew's.

Stunning close ups of the east window at St Andrew's.







WHERE DO YOU LIKE TO GO ON HOLIDAY?


I love Sorrento and Rome. NYC was incredible too.


IF YOU HAD A CHOICE WHERE WOULD YOU LIVE?

Minutes of a Meeting of the Parochial Church Council on Wednesday 8th January 2020

1. The Vicar welcomed members of the PCC and gave an opening prayer

2. Apologies: John Wickenden

3. Approval of minutes of previous meeting

Item 5: "analogue rather than digital" was corrected to "digital rather than analogue" The phrase "Helen asked whether RG Jones, who designed the original system, could be asked to submit an estimate" was inserted before "Gary Buckley proposed".

Item 7: "Anne Barker will open and close St Marks" was added. After these amendments, the Vicar signed the minutes as correct.

4. Matters Arising

The Secretary will send a copy of the December minutes to Mary Elliott and will distribute the draft minutes earlier in the future.

Audio System

After discussion, members of the PCC contributed the following observations:

Positive: We are addressing the problems with the audio system. The volume is better at the back of St Andrews and the induction loop is better at St Marks.

Negative: The system is loud but not clear in the chancel at St Andrews and there is a lot of feedback. The sound from the big speakers at St Andrews is better during quiet services. However, when there was a lot of background noise as in Christingle, the sound is not good. Clergy notice that the volume goes up and down for no reason. In both churches, the volume is loud but often unclear. The clergy microphones are not clear. The lectern is much better. The controls need to be simpler because churchwardens will not have time to operate them and external hirers need to be able to use them. Freestanding microphones are valuable items that can be stolen. At St Andrews, feedback occurs when two members of the clergy stand together. Something happens when clergy go behind the font at St Marks. The induction loop is not working in the south aisle at St Andrews.

Martin explained that the head of Sounds 4 Churches, our chosen contractor, died suddenly in December before the job was finished. His son Stephen is now running the company. Martin is trying to adjust the system to fix the problems and thinks that it will be clear in three weeks whether it can be made to work. At that point a default setting can be implemented that can be turned on with a simple switch. If the problems are not fixed in three weeks, the PCC will ask Stephen to come back. If Stephen cannot make the system fit for purpose, the PCC will return the equipment for a refund. At present, the PCC has paid £9000 of the £12,600 estimate. The PCC will decide at the February meeting whether to ask another contractor to do the job. Meanwhile, the Vicar will explain what is going on to the congregation. The PCC thanked Martin for all his work on this project.

Parish Reserves Policy

The Big Picture Sub-committee will propose a Parish Reserves Policy at a future meeting.

1. PCC Approval of Annual Report format

Anne Miller is happy to compile the Annual Report again. She will commission input for a draft to be presented to the March PCC meeting. The report needs to meet Charity Commission requirements and also serve as a parish newsletter. The Vicar, as Area Dean, has been invited by the Diocese to attend a conference in Korea from 16th April until 3rd May. The PCC decided to hold the April meeting on Tuesday 14 April and set the APCM for Sunday 3rd May after the 9.15 service at St Marks. Anne Miller was asked to condense the report further as some members of the PCC thought it too long. She will also include a section in which subcommittees can report on their activity.

2. Photocopier Lease

The PCC agreed that Clare Chesterman should choose whichever photocopier she thinks best.

3. Renew Complaints, Domestic Abuse policies

The renewal of the Safeguarding policy was postponed until a later date when the safeguarding officers will be invited. Andrew Miskin proposed and Andrew Horn seconded the renewal of the Complaints and Domestic Abuse policies.

4. Review Parish Risk Register and financial controls

Financial Controls: The Treasurer feels that our present controls are not sufficient to prevent some types of fraud. He will consult with the Independent Examiner. Mary Elliott will send him a link to the Charity Commission advice on financial controls. We want to examine our processes to ensure that only genuine invoices be paid. The Treasurer will make a proposal for stricter controls at a future meeting. **Risk Register:** The PCC adopted a Risk Register in January 2019 with the caveat that financial risks be added. The PCC felt that although the likelihood of a breach of GDPR might be low, the significance could potentially be high. Diana Lewis will work with the Vicar on redrafting the risk register.

5. Diocesan Safeguarding past cases review

The Vicar asked members of the PCC to submit a form to the Diocese or speak to him if they remember any safeguarding cases that were not addressed over the past 20 to 40 years. He will inquire whether other parishes extend this request to members of the entire congregation.

6. Crematorium fee removal

The £30 fee for crematorium funerals has been eliminated. This does not affect SASM because we use the Deanery system for funerals.


7. Review of Parish activities and forward planning

Christmas attendance continues to rise. Children and adults created over 400 Christingles in a little over an hour. The Midnight Mass sermon was very good. The school carol services were particularly successful this year. Our own carol service was very atmospheric. The Christmas lunch move to Surbiton High School worked out well. With the new seating plan, the Christingle services felt safe and comfortable. Members of the PCC suggested that it might be better not to have all members of the clergy on holiday after Christmas. A blue Christmas service might be a nice addition.

8. Urgent Any Other Business

The PCC thanked Michael Smith for his beautiful restoration of the cross and candlesticks at St Marks. Both boilers at St Marks are leaking. Churchwardens are getting quotes on replacement or repair. The volunteer response to the Night Shelter appeal was very good this year, possible up to 30 people. The shelter will open in February and March. The food rota is sorted, and everything is going well.

The next meeting will be on Wednesday 12th February, 2020 at 8.00pm at St Mark's Church.





The first record of a church in Send appears in William the Conqueror's record "The Domesday Book" compiled in 1085.


